Canberra and Nara are **Sister Cities**

Following almost 20 years of regular contact, the official signing of the proclamation of a Canberra Nara Sister City relationship occurred in Nara on October 26, 1993.

The links between our two cities were initiated by private citizens and the business community. Governments of the ACT and Nara City continue to foster and encourage our city to city friendship. Today, we have a vibrant relationship with regular and increasing links between schools, cultural and sporting organisations, Rotary clubs, professional associations, businesses, and Governments. The strength of the friendship was never more evident than in 2003, when the people of Nara contributed generously to Canberra's post bushfire appeal.

Arts, Culture and Society

Nara and Canberra are rich in culture, heritage, and contemporary arts. Nara prides itself on the finest samples of arts and architecture that reach back 1300 years to when it was Japan's capital. A testament to its uniqueness is the inclusion of eight sites on the UNESCO world heritage list: the temples Todaiji, Kofuku-ji, Gango-ji, Yakushi-ji, Toshodai-ji, the Kasuga Grand Shrine, Kasuga-yama Hill Primeval Forest, and the Heijo Palace Site. Closely related to these sites are Nara's traditional festivals, forming an important part of the cultural calendar.

Nara is famous for traditional arts and crafts, including linen textiles, calligraphy, traditional painting, ceramics, sculpture and the production of exquisite inks and brushes.

Canberra has a lively art scene with studios, workshops, exhibition spaces, theatres, galleries, and museums showcasing Australia's multicultural fabric. Sister City cultural exchanges include exhibitions, bands and choirs, and children's art.

Canberra Nara Peace Park has been developed on the banks of Lake Burley Griffin to symbolise the friendship between our cities. The Park provides a perfect setting for the two stone lanterns and a memorial stone gifted to Canberra from the citizens of Nara. The "Toku" (virtue) sculpture by Shinki Kato commemorates our sister city relationship. The name of the sculpture, "Toku," signifies a prayer for eternal peace between the two countries. The shape of the sculpture was inspired by Horyu-ji temple, which was rebuilt 1,300 years ago by Prince Shotoku.

Canberra Nara Peace Park hosts the annual Canberra Nara Candle Festival held in October. The Festival boasts a display of thousands of elegant candles and entertainment, food and cultural activities to celebrate the Sister City relationship.

Nara Grove, a stand of Australian trees and shrubs, is situated on Black Mountain Peninsula across the lake from Canberra Nara Peace Park and commemorates visits of Nara delegations to Canberra.

Tourism

Canberra and Nara are both popular tourist destinations. Canberra as the modern, young national capital of Australia and Nara as the ancient capital of Japan.
