20/459 - ACT Bushfire and Flood Recovery Plan 2020

Summary of impacts:

- Research demonstrates the costs of environmental remediation rise exponentially in the absence of immediate to medium-term recovery action. A range of environmental impacts and risks have been identified in the Rapid Risk Assessment Report undertaken immediately after the fire and storm events of 2020. A number of impacts were identified as needing mitigation, restoration and conservation works including catchment instability, impacts on water quality, stream habitat and in-stream fauna. Weed and pest vertebrate incursions can occur post major disturbances such as fire and flood and control measures will address issues in the short and long-term.
- Canberrans and the Ngunnawal community have a strong affinity with nature. Over 600,000 people visit Namadgi National Park and Tidbinbilla Nature Reserve annually. The wellbeing benefits of having exceptional drinking water and access to nature are significant. The environmental integrity and quality of the Park is important to the Canberra community.
- Adaptive management, remediation and ongoing protection will have a net benefit on the Park's intrinsic environmental values. Proposed repair and mitigation work include those to improve bank stability, reduce erosion and improve water quality; control feral animals and weeds and help protect threatened species and ecological communities and maintain the integrity of alpine bogs and fens through stream stabilisation and the removal of feral herbivores. Not responding to these matters in the environment post fire and floods can lead to a decline in the environmental condition of the Parks and the loss of iconic and critically endangered species including the corroboree frog and various alpine orchids.
