I refer to your application under section 30 of the *Freedom of Information Act 2016* (the Act), received by the Chief Minister, Treasury and Economic Development Directorate (CMTEDD) on 10 August 2021, in which you sought access to:

- Public polling, surveys, focus groups, market research or other consulting conducted by, or commissioned by the Directorate with regards to the pandemic, COVID-19, health directions, restrictions or government performance;
- Any briefing materials or reports prepared for the Chief Minister or Directorate with regards to any of the aforementioned data.

Authority

I am an Information Officer appointed by the Director-General under section 18 of the Act to deal with access applications made under Part 5 of the Act.

Timeframes

In accordance with section 40 of the Act, CMTEDD is required to provide a decision on your access application by 7 September 2021.

Decision on access

Searches were completed for relevant documents and four documents were identified that fall within the scope of your request.

I have included as **Attachment A** to this decision the schedule of relevant documents. This provides a description of each document that falls within the scope of your request and the access decision for each of those documents.

I have decided to grant full access to all relevant documents. The documents released to you are provided as **Attachment B** to this letter.

Charges

Pursuant to *Freedom of Information (Fees) Determination 2018* processing charges are applicable for this request because the total number of pages to be released to you exceeds the charging threshold of 50 pages. However, I have decided to waive the charges in this specific instance.

Background: The ACT Government conducted an eighth round of research with the YourSay Community Panel focusing on how coronavirus (COVID-19) is impacting Canberrans. The focus of the survey was on public awareness, attitudes and information needs regarding a COVID-19 vaccine, along with engagement in COVID-safe practices, perceptions of community and ACT Government response to COVID-19, and future outlook.

Purpose: The findings from the survey will help inform ACT Government public health messaging to encourage Canberrans to participate in the COVID-19 vaccination roll-out as well as continue to engage in COVID-safe behaviours.

Timeframe: The survey took place between **29 Jan – 7 Feb 2021**.

Sample: 1,417 YourSay Community Panel members completed the survey.

Weighting: The results have been weighted to reflect relative population proportions based on Australian Bureau of Statistics (ABS) Census figures.


Rounding: In single choice questions, results may not add up to 100% due to rounding.











More than nine in ten Canberrans say they will definitely or probably get a COVID-19 vaccine

Q. If a COVID-19 vaccine was made available to you, would you get it?












Q. How much do you agree that... Overall, I feel I am being kept well informed about the roll-out of a COVID-19 vaccine/s










Most preferred location for vaccine is through GP













Q. Thinking about things as we head into 2021, how much do you agree or disagree with the following...



Background: The ACT Government has conducted eight rounds of research with the YourSay Community Panel focusing on how coronavirus (COVID-19) is impacting Canberrans. In the latest round (Round 8), the survey was also extended to non-panel members through a call-out on ACT Health social media pages. **This report contains findings from non-panel members**.

The focus of the survey was on public awareness, attitudes and information needs regarding a COVID-19 vaccine, along with engagement in COVID-safe practices, perceptions of community and ACT Government response to COVID-19, and future outlook.

Purpose: The findings from the survey will help inform ACT Government public health messaging to encourage Canberrans to participate in the COVID-19 vaccination roll-out as well as continue to engage in COVID-safe behaviours.

Timeframe: The survey took place between **2 – 9 Feb 2021**.

Sample: 2,268 Canberrans completed the survey.
















Q. If a COVID-19 vaccine was made available to you, would you get it?








Q. What are the main reason/s you would probably or definitely get a COVID-19 vaccine?



Q. How much do you agree that... Overall, I feel I am being kept well informed about the roll-out of a COVID-19 vaccine/s


























Q. Thinking about things as we head into 2021, how much do you agree or disagree with the following...




Levels of optimism are fairly uniform across age groups, though resilience tends to increase with age

Background: The ACT Government conducted a ninth round of research with the YourSay Community Panel focusing on how coronavirus (COVID-19) is impacting Canberrans. The survey examined the perspectives of the community on the COVID-19 vaccine roll-out and related issues including overseas travel and influenza vaccination. The survey also continued to explore Canberrans' engagement in COVID-safe practices and perceptions of the community and Government response to the pandemic.

Purpose: The findings from the survey will help inform ACT Government public health messaging to encourage Canberrans to participate in the COVID-19 vaccination roll-out as well as continue to engage in COVID-safe behaviours.

Timeframe: The survey took place between **18 – 24 May 2021** (prior to Melbourne cases).

Sample: 1,911 YourSay Community Panel members completed the survey.


Weighting: The results have been weighted to reflect relative population proportions based on Australian Bureau of Statistics (ABS) Census figures.


Rounding: In single choice questions, results may not add up to 100% due to rounding.

Sample profile (unweighted)










One in ten Canberrans intend to go to New Zealand this year, while appetite for other overseas travel exists among four in ten

Q. How likely are you to travel to New Zealand this year? **Q.** And how likely are you to travel to other overseas destinations once restrictions have been eased?










Q. When a COVID-19 vaccine is available to you, will you get it?








Q. What's your preferred place/s to get a COVID-19 vaccine?


Q. Overall, how much do you agree or disagree with the following?


Q. COVID-19 vaccines will be available in phases. In which phase are you eligible to receive the vaccine?





Availability of the flu vaccine for free is a key driver to uptake, while COVID-related concerns resonate for some


Q. What made you decide to get / plan to get the influenza vaccine in 2021?

Q. Why have you decided not to get an influenza vaccine in 2021?






One in eight are unaware of advice regarding gap between COVID-19 and flu vaccines







Q. How frequently do you tend to use this to check in when visiting venues across Canberra?












YourSay Community Panel COVID-19 Round 10 Survey

Background: The ACT Government conducted a tenth round of research with the YourSay Panel focusing on how Coronavirus (COVID-19) is impacting Canberrans. The survey focused on community attitudes and behaviours in relation to face masks, vaccination and other COVID-safe behaviours, along with measures of community and government response.

Purpose: The findings from the survey will help inform ACT Government public health messaging to support mask-wearing, COVID-19 vaccination, and continue to engage in other COVID-safe behaviours as the situation across Australia evolves.

Timeframe: The survey took place between **2 – 6 July 2021**, during which masks were mandatory in certain settings in the ACT.

Sample: 2,130 YourSay Community Panel members completed the survey.





Round 10 sample profile (unweighted)










Canberrans are aware of the mask mandate, with many hearing about it via local media



Almost all Canberrans have their own face masks


Q. Do you have your own face mask/s?

Q. How often this week have you worn a face mask when outside your home?




Females are more likely to always wear a face mask outdoors than males

Q. How confident are you that you know how to use a face mask correctly?




Confidence in correct face mask use appears higher than in August 2020, when 72% were extremely or very confident










Longitudinal sample shows positive conversion to vaccine uptake






Education level is emerging as a distinguishing factor in relation to vaccine hesitancy

Those who have had a vaccine are more likely to agree it is going well (51%), compared to those who haven't (33%)





Q. Overall, how much do you agree or disagree with the following?






Who is less likely to engage in COVID-safe behaviours?

There is a strong relationship between vaccine intent and COVID-safe behaviours, with those unlikely to get a vaccine also less likely to engage in other protective actions

Meanwhile, there is no evidence in the data to suggest that those who have been vaccinated are less likely to engage in other protective behaviours following vaccination

Elsewhere, age is also a factor in terms of compliance, at both ends of the spectrum







Perceptions of the Government response have dipped while perceptions of the community's response have improved


