20/441 Heads of Agreement for Skills Reform and JobTrainer Fund

Summary of impacts:

- **Economic impacts** access to the JobTrainer Fund would enable people who have lost their job as a result of COVID-19, or had their employment significantly changed, to up-skill or re-skill and improve their employment prospects. It will also increase opportunities for school leavers, and students in their final years of schooling, to develop skills in-demand in an environment of expected high youth unemployment resulting from COVID-19.
- **Social impacts:** access to fee-free training and skills development would increase the likelihood of people, who would otherwise be unemployed or under-employed, to improve their job prospects. This would support the well-being of the ACT community.
