Summary of Impacts

People with disability are significantly over-represented as victims of crime, alleged perpetrators and in detention and community corrections environments. The Disability Justice Strategy will support the fundamental human right of access to justice for people with disability, which will improve the ACT justice system for everyone.

Key to impacts: Red – negative, Blue – neutral, Green – positive.

Social

Justice and rights	The Disability Justice Strategy will positively impact on justice and rights. The strategy aims to achieve equal access to justice for people with disability. Improving the justice system for people with disability will have a broader positive impact on other people in contact with the justice system as the system will be more accessible generally.
Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander	 Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people are over-represented both among people with disability and those engaged with the justice system. The Disability Justice Strategy will help to address the over-representation of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people in the justice system, and ensure that Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander victims of crime feel safer and more supported to report crime and have matters addressed appropriately.
