# S41 FOI Act 1989



I refer to your application under the ACT *Freedom of Information Act 1989* (the FOI Act), received by the Directorate on 23 February 2015, in which you sought access to the following information:

"...I am wanting to understand how the ACT Government currently supports people with disability with housing, specifically:

- How many people with disability live in a supported accommodation or group home service that is provided directly by Disability ACT?
- How many properties (houses/apartments/dwellings) are used to provide this supported accommodation?
- How many of these dwellings are owned by the ACT Government (Housing ACT or Disability ACT), rented from private landlords, or provided through other ownership arrangements?
- How many ACT Government owned housing properties are leased to nongovernment providers to deliver supported accommodation or group home services?
- How many people with disability live in an ACT Government owned housing property are leased to non-government providers to deliver supported accommodation or group home services?
- How many ACT Government owned housing properties are leased to disability service providers to deliver 'respite' services?

Note: This request does not include any housing that is provided by Housing ACT directly to people with disability as public housing tenants – only housing that is being used for specialist accommodation services or respite services."

Under the FOI Act, section 22, I am an officer authorised to make a decision in respect of a request for information.

The NDIS will provide individualised support for eligible people with a permanent and significant disability, their families and carers within the non-government sector. The Scheme (NDIS) was introduced in July 2013 in response to the need for reform of disability services across Australia.

Disability ACT is currently phasing its services to the private sector and is due to have transferred all services by 30 June 2017.

## **Decision**

In response to each of the six dot points raised in your request, the relevant information along with explanatory notes has been provided below. The information provided is correct as at 2 March 2016, the statistical information changes on a daily basis as result of the transitioning of services to the private sector.

## Points 1-3:

- 1. How many people with disability live in a supported accommodation or group home service that is provided directly by Disability ACT?;
- 2. How many properties (houses/apartments/dwellings) are used to provide this supported accommodation?; and
- 3. How many of these dwellings are owned by the ACT Government (Housing ACT or Disability ACT), rented from private landlords, or provided through other ownership arrangements?

As of the 2 March 2016, Disability ACT supported 80 people with a disability across 29 properties. Housing ACT (Community Services Directorate, ACT Government) owns all 29 properties.

#### Point 4:

How many ACT Government owned housing properties are leased to non-government providers to deliver supported accommodation or group home services?

Housing ACT currently lease733 properties to non-government organisations through the Housing Asset Assistance Program (HAAP). These properties are head leased to community organisations which provide a range of services including supported accommodation and group homes.

## Point 5:

• How many people with disability live in an ACT Government owned housing property are leased to non-government providers to deliver supported accommodation or group home services?

Housing ACT does not collect data on how many people with disability live in Housing ACT owned properties leased to non-government providers to deliver supported accommodation or group home services.

#### Point 6:

• How many ACT Government owned housing properties are leased to disability service providers to deliver 'respite' services?

Housing ACT does not lease their properties for the specific purpose of 'respite' services.

# **Review rights**

My decision is reviewable under the Act. This means that if you are dissatisfied with this outcome you have a right to seek a review under section 59 of the Act.
